Room to breathe, close to everything.

For families seeking peace, privacy, and space, Topsfield and Boxford deliver. These communities offer rural character and a lifestyle that feels removed from the hustle of everyday life while still remaining close to everything the North Shore has to offer.

While the Topsfield Fair may be what first comes to mind, the town offers much more than a few weeks of excitement each fall.

Families are drawn to Topsfield for its excellent schools, strong sense of community, open space, and easy access to some of the North Shore's best outdoor recreation.

Bradley Palmer State Park, just over the town line, provides miles of trails for hiking, biking, horseback riding, and cross-country skiing. Community events, youth sports, and local traditions help give Topsfield the kind of small-town atmosphere many families are searching for.

The fair may put Topsfield on the map, but it's the community that keeps people here.

Boxford State Forest

Miles of trails and outdoor recreation, with conservation land that is a defining feature of the community. Your backyard often feels like a nature preserve.

Rural character is one of Boxford's greatest strengths, and conservation land throughout the area means open space is never far away.

Crane Beach — one of New England's most beautiful stretches of sand.

Appleton Farms — trails, animals, and seasonal events at one of the country's oldest working farms.

Ipswich River Wildlife Sanctuary — miles of trails and quiet water to explore.

A Brush with Fame


In 2025, Ipswich found itself in an unexpected spotlight when Ed Sheeran chose the town as the backdrop for the music video to "Old Phone," the first single from his album *Play*. Sheeran — a devoted fan of the English football club Ipswich Town — loved the idea of filming in its Massachusetts namesake, and built a pop-up Irish pub in a downtown parking lot for a surprise performance. Fans earned their way inside by sharing nostalgic texts and photos from their old phones, some of which were projected onto a building wall for the shoot. The documentary-style video, released in May 2025, turned downtown Ipswich and its local businesses into the heart of the story.

Castle Hill at Crane Estate

One of New England's most iconic destinations. The Great House, rolling lawns, and spectacular views create a setting unlike anything else on the North Shore. For many local families, it isn't simply a historic property — it's where memories are made. Concerts on the Lawn have become one of the most beloved family traditions anywhere on the North Shore: a blanket, a picnic, children running freely across the Grand Allee, and the sun setting over the Atlantic. Pure North Shore magic.

Hamilton & Wenham

Small-town New England at its best.

If someone asked you to picture a classic New England town, Hamilton and Wenham might be exactly what comes to mind. Tree-lined roads. Stone walls. Historic homes. Youth sports. Community traditions. Open fields. And families who know one another.

These neighboring communities share a school district, many community resources, and a similar commitment to preserving the character that has made them beloved by generations of residents. For many families, Hamilton and Wenham represent the North Shore at its most timeless.

Weekend Life

A typical Saturday might include soccer at Patton Park, a stop at Tendercrop Farm, exploring Appleton Farms, time at the library, a trip to the lake, and dinner with friends. Life here tends to move at a slightly slower pace — and for many families, that's exactly the appeal.

Hamilton

FAMILY FAVORITE

Patton Park

Hamilton's community hub — playgrounds, sports fields, and summer evenings where children make friends and parents do too. Named for General George S. Patton, whose family had strong ties to town.

Operated by The Trustees, Appleton Farms is one of the oldest continuously operating farms in the United States. Families come for the trails, animals, and seasonal events. Many North Shore childhood memories begin here.

A North Shore Secret: Chebacco Lake

When most people think of the North Shore, they think of the ocean. What many don't realize is that Hamilton is home to one of the region's hidden treasures: Chebacco Lake. For families who discover it, the lake often becomes a way of life. Mornings begin with paddleboards. Afternoons bring sailing lessons. Evenings end with fishing, sunset cruises, and time spent on the dock.

Unlike many lakes in Massachusetts, Chebacco supports a wide range of recreation:

- ◆ Sailing
- ◆ Kayaking
- ◆ Canoeing
- ◆ Paddleboarding
- ◆ Fishing
- ◆ Power boating
- ◆ Waterskiing

The one thing you won't find here? Jet skis. The result is a family-friendly atmosphere that residents work hard to preserve. Centennial Grove, a public freshwater beach, gives residents access throughout the summer, and a public boat launch keeps the lake part of the broader community — not just those who live directly on the water.

On the Big Screen

Hollywood came to Chebacco Lake in the summer of 2009, when Adam Sandler and the cast of *Grown Ups* moved into town for filming. Much of the on-location shooting took place around Centennial Grove, which stood in for the fictional “Amoskeag Lake” and served as the setting for the Earnshaw family’s rustic lakefront house.

THE RIPPLE EFFECT TAKE

Most North Shore towns are defined by their connection to the ocean, but Hamilton offers something different; a place where children can grow up sailing on a lake, exploring conservation land, visiting working farms, and still be only minutes from the Atlantic Ocean. As a Chebacco Lake resident, I may be slightly biased, but there’s something special about lake life on Cape Ann. It’s one of the few places where a child can spend the morning fishing from a dock, the afternoon at Crane Beach, and the evening watching the sunset over the water.

Wenham

Quiet charm, deep roots, and room to explore.

Wenham doesn't try to impress people. And that's exactly why so many families fall in love with it. Horse farms, stone walls, historic homes, conservation land, and tree-lined roads give Wenham the feel of a town that has intentionally protected its character while the world around it has changed.

For families looking for a slower pace and a strong sense of community, Wenham offers a lifestyle that feels increasingly rare on Boston's North Shore. While it shares schools, youth programs, and many community resources with Hamilton, Wenham has a personality all its own — a timeless town center, neighbors who know one another, and children who still ride bikes around town and gather at local parks.

Family Favorites

Tendercrop Farm — part grocery store, part farm stand, part community gathering place. Produce, baked goods, cider donuts, flowers, and locally prepared meals make it a weekend tradition; many families stop in for one item and leave with dinner and dessert.

Wenham Museum — one of the hidden gems of the North Shore, built around childhood, history, and hands-on learning, with interactive exhibits, model trains, and a historic house.

The Wenham Tea House — part restaurant, part local institution, serving families for generations and a setting for countless birthdays and celebrations.

Outdoor Life

One of Wenham's biggest strengths is access to nature. Conservation land, trails, ponds, and open spaces — Wenham Lake, Cedar Pond, Pleasant Pond, and the trail networks around town and behind Gordon College — are some of the community's greatest assets, and nature is never far away.

TOWN BY TOWN

Beverly

The town that has everything.

If the North Shore has a community that can do a little bit of everything, it might be Beverly. Beaches. Restaurants. Arts and culture. The energy comes from the fact that there's always something happening — new restaurants open regularly, and community events fill the calendar. Families have access to beaches, arts, sports, dining, and entertainment all within a relatively compact city.

Having lived in Beverly for more than two decades, my family has watched it evolve while still maintaining the neighborhood feel that makes people want to stay.

Family Favorites

Lynch Park is arguably Beverly's crown jewel — playgrounds, waterfront views, open lawns, walking paths, gardens, and community events make it one of the most beloved gathering places on the North Shore. Dane Street Beach is perfect for quick summer outings, and the Beverly Public Library offers programs and activities for children of all ages.

FAMILY FAVORITE

The Cabot

One of Beverly's greatest success stories. Over the last decade it has transformed downtown into a destination for arts and entertainment — children's performances, movies, comedy, and nationally touring acts, all without leaving town. A place where multiple generations can enjoy the same stage.

Family favorites, food edition:

- ◆ Depot Diner — a North Shore breakfast institution
- ◆ Anchor Pub — a kid- and dog-friendly outdoor patio in the warmer months
- ◆ Nick's Roast Beef — a Beverly classic

A City of Neighborhoods

A collection of distinct neighborhoods, connected by community.

One of Beverly's greatest strengths is that it doesn't feel like a city in the traditional sense. Instead, it feels like a collection of distinct neighborhoods connected by a shared sense of community. Families often find themselves developing loyalties to their favorite beaches, parks, coffee shops, sports programs, and local events. Over time, those places become part of the rhythm of everyday life.

Beverly also embraces its waterfront in a way that shapes the character of the city. From Lynch Park and Dane Street Beach to Beverly Harbor and the city's marinas, the ocean is never far away. Summer evenings often mean a walk along the water, a stop for ice cream, or simply watching boats return to the harbor.

Throughout the year, community events help bring residents together. Farmers markets, downtown festivals, holiday celebrations, youth sports, arts events, and waterfront activities create a calendar that stays active in every season.

For many families, Beverly offers something increasingly difficult to find: the energy and amenities of a larger community while still maintaining the feeling of a hometown.

School snapshot: Beverly Public Schools provide a wide range of academic, athletic, arts, and vocational opportunities, and families often appreciate the diversity of educational pathways available throughout the district.

We've watched Beverly become one of the great comeback stories on the North Shore. When Amy and I moved there in 2003, downtown was quieter and many of the historic storefronts had yet to find new life. Since then, artists and entrepreneurs helped shape a thriving downtown. Breweries brought new energy to the city. And The Cabot became one of the great success stories on the North Shore, transforming from a historic theater into a cultural anchor that draws everyone from children's performers to nationally touring musicians. We were fortunate enough to raise our children here. And watching Beverly grow up alongside them was pretty special.

TOWN BY TOWN

Danvers

The North Shore's convenience champion.

Danvers rarely receives the attention of its coastal neighbors. That's surprising, because for many families Danvers quietly checks more boxes than almost any other North Shore community: central location, excellent access, strong recreation programs, and a practical, everyday lifestyle that makes raising children a little easier.

Weekend Life

A typical Danvers Saturday might include Endicott Park, youth sports, lunch with friends, a stop at Cherry Farm Creamery, errands, and dinner nearby. Danvers tends to simplify everyday life — and when you're raising a family, that matters.

FAMILY FAVORITE

Endicott Park

Few places appear more often on local parents' recommendation lists. Animals, playgrounds, trails, fields, and community events make it a regular part of childhood for many North Shore children.

— Family Enrichment Spotlight: The Little Gym of Danvers

Many families initially discover The Little Gym looking for an activity. What they often find is something much larger: confidence, friendships, community. Through classes, camps, birthday parties, and special events, thousands of North Shore children have built skills that extend far beyond the gym floor.

Located just down the road from The Little Gym of Danvers, Cherry Farm Creamery has become a North Shore tradition. Families stop after camps, after sports, after birthday parties, after school — and sometimes simply because it's a beautiful summer evening. Every North Shore family seems to have a Cherry Farm memory.

School snapshot: Danvers Public Schools offer strong academics, athletics, arts, and extracurricular opportunities supported by an active community.

Danvers has played a special role in our family's story. When Amy opened The Little Gym, we chose Danvers because it sits at the crossroads of the North Shore. Families from Beverly, Peabody, Salem, Hamilton, Wenham, Topsfield, Boxford, and beyond can all get here easily. Over the years, we've watched thousands of local children walk through those doors, and it's reinforced something we've always appreciated about Danvers: it's a community built around accessibility, convenience, and family life.

TOWN BY TOWN

Salem

More than October.

Mention Salem and most people immediately think of Halloween. Locals know there's much more to the story. Salem is one of the North Shore's most vibrant communities, offering a unique combination of history, culture, walkability, waterfront access, restaurants, museums, and year-round events. It's a city that embraces its identity while continuing to evolve.

Weekend Life

A typical Salem Saturday might include coffee downtown, a walk through Salem Common, a museum visit, exploring the waterfront, lunch at a local restaurant, and a community event or festival. There is almost always something happening.

What to Know

Like Beverly, Salem is active, and traffic can be heavier than in many neighboring communities. October brings visitors from around the world, and the city becomes busier, louder, and more crowded. For some that's a reason to avoid Salem; for many local families, it's part of the fun. The families who embrace it tend to have the most fun.

FAMILY FAVORITE

Peabody Essex Museum

One of the premier museums in New England and an outstanding resource for families — one of the North Shore's greatest cultural resources.



Salem Common is a year-round gathering place for families, the Salem Maritime National Historic Site makes history tangible, and Forest River Park offers waterfront access, open space, and recreation.

Family favorites, food edition:

Peabody

What it does exceptionally well is everyday life: convenient access to major highways, strong recreation programs, shopping, dining, parks, youth sports, and easy connections to neighboring communities. For many families, those things matter more than postcard views.

Weekend Life

A typical Peabody Saturday might include a visit to Brooksby Farm, youth sports, shopping or errands, lunch with family, recreation programs, and time outdoors. Peabody tends to make life easier — and when you're juggling work, school, activities, and family commitments, that's a valuable quality.

FAMILY FAVORITE

Brooksby Farm

Few places are more closely associated with family life in Peabody. Generations have visited for apple picking, seasonal events, farm animals, and fresh produce. For many local children, a trip to Brooksby Farm is simply part of growing up.

School snapshot: Peabody Public Schools offer a variety of academic, athletic, arts, and vocational opportunities supported by a strong community network.

Masconomo Park offers a beautiful gathering place overlooking Manchester Harbor, and downtown Manchester is walkable, welcoming, and full of small-town charm.

Gloucester

Adventure starts here.

Gloucester is for families who love the ocean — not just looking at it, but living it. The city continues to evolve while remaining true to its fishing-village roots. In recent years, downtown Gloucester has seen a noticeable resurgence, with new restaurants, community events, and destinations such as The Cut creating a vibrant arts and entertainment scene that draws locals and visitors throughout the year. Families are discovering that Gloucester offers far more than beaches: a unique blend of maritime history, outdoor adventure, arts, and culture.

Family Favorites

Good Harbor Beach — a North Shore summer classic.

Wingaersheek Beach — gentle tidal flats made for young families.

Stage Fort Park — playgrounds, history, and sweeping harbor views.

HarborWalk — a waterfront stroll through the city's seafaring story.

A Note About Cape Ann

Just beyond Gloucester lies neighboring Rockport, one of New England's most iconic coastal communities. Known for galleries, artists, harbor views, and classic seaside charm, Rockport can get busy in peak season, but many North Shore families enjoy spending weekends exploring its shops, beaches, and waterfront.

Where Families Eat

Minglewood Tavern — live music and tavern favorites on an open harborside deck.

The Causeway Restaurant — heaping plates of fried seafood worth the wait.

Lobsta Land — a longtime local favorite overlooking the salt marsh.

On the Big Screen

Gloucester's deep fishing heritage has even reached the big screen. The Perfect Storm tells the story of a 1991 nor'easter and the Gloucester fishing crew lost at sea. The Hollywood film adaptation was shot on location here in 1999, before its release in 2000, putting the city's working waterfront in front of audiences around the world.

Raising Kids Near the Water

One of the greatest gifts of growing up on the North Shore.

Ask adults who grew up on the North Shore what they remember most about childhood, and you'll hear many of the same themes. The beach. The harbor. The lake. The dock. The boat. The river. The salt air. The freedom.

There's something special about raising children around water, and the North Shore offers that opportunity in countless ways. Whether your family spends weekends sailing on Chebacco Lake, exploring tide pools in Gloucester, paddling the Essex River, or building sand castles at Crane Beach, water has a way of becoming part of everyday life here. And over time, those experiences become part of who your children are.

— The Childhood Most Kids Dream About

Childhood today can feel increasingly scheduled — practices, lessons, screens, activities, calendars packed from morning until bedtime. One of the beautiful things about life on the North Shore is that some of the best experiences remain wonderfully simple. A kayak. A fishing rod. A bucket for shells. A paddleboard. A beach towel. Water has a way of slowing things down. It invites exploration, encourages curiosity, and creates the kind of unstructured adventures children rarely forget.

— The Magic of Low Tide

One of the simplest joys of growing up here is learning that the beach changes every day — especially at low tide. At Wingaersheek Beach, children can walk far beyond the normal shoreline, exploring sandbars and shallow pools. At Crane Beach, long walks reveal a constantly changing landscape. Along rocky coastlines, tide pools become tiny worlds waiting to be explored.

Children discover:

- ◆ Hermit crabs
- ◆ Tiny fish
- ◆ Shells

- ◆ Seaweed forests
- ◆ Small marine creatures

— **Essex River Adventures**

The Essex River introduces families to a completely different side of the North Shore. Unlike the beaches, the river feels quieter, more intimate, more connected to nature. Families paddle through winding marshes while watching osprey, egrets, herons, hawks, and seals. The scenery feels almost untouched — one of the most beautiful and peaceful experiences available anywhere on the North Shore.

— **Learning Independence**

Water teaches children lessons that are difficult to learn anywhere else: patience, responsibility, problem solving, confidence. Whether it's learning to paddle a kayak, cast a fishing line, tie a knot, or steer a sailboat, children develop skills that stay with them for life. Many North Shore parents will tell you the same thing — some of their children's biggest confidence-building moments happened on the water.

— **You Don't Need a Yacht**

One of the great misconceptions about waterfront life is that it's expensive. The truth is that many of the happiest family memories happen on the simplest adventures: a small fishing boat, a used kayak, a canoe, a paddleboard, a public beach, a dock, a cooler full of sandwiches. The boat isn't the point. The time together is.

THE RIPPLE EFFECT TAKE

One of the greatest gifts of living on the North Shore is that adventure doesn't require a vacation. It's already in your backyard — and for many families, that's exactly what makes this place feel like home.

Moving With Kids

Because a move is more than a new address.

Adults tend to think about moving in practical terms: the house, the mortgage, the inspection, the closing, the moving truck. Children experience a move very differently. To a child, moving often means a new bedroom, a new school, new friends, new routines, a new playground, a new neighborhood — and sometimes, a lot of uncertainty. That's why helping children through a move can be every bit as important as finding the right house. In many ways, it's more important.

— The Question Beneath the Question

Parents often hear questions like, “Will my toys come with us?” “Can I still see my friends?” “Will I have my own room?” “What's my new school like?” But underneath those questions is often a much bigger one — a question children don't always know how to ask: “Am I going to be okay?” They're not worried about square footage. They're worried about belonging. And those concerns are completely normal.

— Children Borrow Their Confidence From Us

Children often take emotional cues from the adults around them. If parents are overwhelmed and focused only on the stress of moving, children often absorb that energy. If parents approach the move as an adventure, children are more likely to see it the same way. That doesn't mean pretending everything is perfect — it means helping children focus on what they're gaining, not just what they're leaving behind.

— Before the Move

Include children in the process — enough that they feel like participants rather than passengers:

- ◆ Show them photos of the new home
- ◆ Visit the neighborhood together
- ◆ Explore a local playground
- ◆ Let them help pack

- ◆ Let them choose decorations for their new room
- ◆ Talk openly about what to expect

FAMILY FAVORITE

Visit a Playground Before Moving Day

A playground is often the first place a child begins imagining life in a new community.

— **The First Day, Week & Month**

Moving day is rarely perfect — boxes everywhere, schedules falling apart, something always misplaced. One piece of advice consistently rises to the top: set up your child's room first, before the garage, the office, or even most of the kitchen. A familiar blanket, favorite books, stuffed animals, and a nightlight help a new house begin feeling like home almost immediately.

In the first week, resist the urge to spend every waking hour unpacking. Make time to explore: a local park, the nearest ice cream shop, the library, a family adventure. Children don't build attachment to a house — they build attachment to experiences. By the first month, belonging begins. The fastest way to help a child feel at home is to help them find their people through sports, classes, clubs, and community events. Friendship accelerates belonging.

— **Keep the Traditions**

One of the biggest mistakes families make after a move is unintentionally abandoning the routines that made life feel familiar — family movie night, Saturday pancakes, Friday pizza, bedtime stories, lake days, beach days. Whatever traditions matter to your family, bring them with you. The house may be new. Your traditions don't have to be.

— **A Note About Schools**

School transitions can feel intimidating for both children and parents. The good news? Children are often more resilient than adults expect. Teachers, schools, and other families all understand transitions, and most children adapt faster than their parents imagine. The key is patience. Belonging takes time, and that's okay. When a child needs a little longer, that's normal too — listen, be patient, acknowledge their feelings, and avoid rushing to solve every concern immediately.

There is no perfect move. The goal isn't perfection — it's helping your family move forward together. A successful move isn't measured by how quickly the boxes disappear. It's measured by how successfully your family builds a new life.
